As I'm sure most of you know by now the trout tournament was not without incident, though. During the tournament, Dave Haberle broke his leg and needed assistance to get back to Kevin Miller's vehicle and to get to the hospital (apparently showing no signs on pain throughout the process, he even called in their team's fish to me on the way to the hospital). We'll have to vote on which one of the many possible handles that this has spawned at the meeting.

I would like to use this opportunity and incident to remind the club of the importance of safety on our outings. Something like this can happen at any time, not to mention the routine injuries like scrapes, cuts, sprained ankles, etc. Please keep safety in mind at all times, especially when in remote areas like trout fishing or on Lake of the Woods. Be prepared to deal with medical issues that can arise. Keep a basic first aid kit in your vehicle and boat or tackle boxes. Have a cell phone or marine band radio available for use if needed and know where you are at in case you need to describe the location to someone else. This is especially true for Swabs on Lake of the Woods. Please do not rely on your Captains to navigate all day long. You need to know where you are coming from, are currently and are going as much as they do in case of an emergency. Also, if you do not already have a basic knowledge of first aid (or wilderness emergency and survival techniques) please take some time to learn. There is a lot of information available that is easy to read and use, whether it's in book form, on the internet in a video, etc. You never know when being prepared will pay off for yourself, your family or your friends.

That's all for now. Until next month, keep your lures in the water and your hooks sharp.

### **Trout Across the Border**

The first tournament of the year was held on March 17 on some of the streams in Wisconsin in Scott and Pierce counties. The event drew a below-average number of Waterdogs, at just 16, but was a fun event for those that did attend. The Weather Committee did a fair job, with temperatures starting in the low 20s, but

warming into the 30s as the day progressed. The club concentrated on the Kinnickinnic and Rush Rivers, and caught brown and brook trout, and one rainbow at various locations on the rivers. The Kinni was more of a bushwhacker's paradise with country that was a little harder to get through. The Kinni is a sand and gravel base with lots of wood in the water, while the Rush is more of a rock and boulder bottom, and a little easier to navigate.

Every team caught fish, with fish counts ranging from 9, up to two teams that caught card limits of 15 trout. The best bite seemed to come early in the day for most teams, although some fish were also caught after the sun rose higher on the water.

In the end, it was the more-experienced team of the Janitor and Shatner, who put together a string of all brown trout, including the biggest brown at 15", to win the tournament. They caught their fish on both spinners and Rapalas in the Rush River. The boys will explain their winning strategy at the next meeting.

## Spinning the Creeks

My son, David (home from college on spring break) and I went to the Rush twice last week to do some trout fishing. Tuesday afternoon we went upstream from the 690 (Stone Hammer) Bridge and had a nice afternoon on the river. The weather was great, the fishing was great, but the catching was tough. I caught a couple of browns and he had one on, but lost it about 4 feet away.

Friday, Buick emailed that he had been over Thursday morning and had great success (14 browns) downstream from the same bridge. This was an area that Buick and I had fished in the tournament with some success. His recommendation was to go farther downstream than we had gone during the tournament.

Saturday morning David and I went back over with the idea of fishing downstream from the Stone Hammer Bridge. We arrived at the bridge about 9:00 AM (college kid hours) and were greeted with 2 other cars already there. (Thought one might have been Felix.) We headed downstream and to our delight didn't see a soul all morning. There were 8 cars at the bridge when we returned at 1:15. It must have been crowded upstream.

We walked about a mile down stream fishing some spots along the way with some success. David caught his first trout on the way down, an 8 inch brook. About a mile down stream, we found a pool about 2 feet deep on the outside of a bend and David hit started catching browns. They were hitting right at the break where the bottom turned from dark rock

to light sand. He picked up 5 in about 15 minutes ranging from 12 to 14.5 inches in length. We worked our way back upstream and continued to catch both browns and brooks. David had 12 fish that he had to unhook to release and another half dozen that were either water or air releases. I ended up with 6 fish caught and another 6 air and water releases at my feet. I lost the biggest brown of my life trying to get a grip on it as I lifted it out of the water. Lesson learned; buy a net, it would have been worth it.

All the fish were caught on Panther Martin spinners, yellow and white barrel and a spotted tan blade with a plain treble hook. The fish didn't like the spinners with hair on the hooks.

Passing on fishing experiences to the next generation is a great way to spend a day and it is even better when it is your son. He said he enjoyed trout fishing even when we weren't catching fish, but I think he is hooked now. Now he wants to it with a fly rod. So, my thanks to the Water Dogs for taking me trout fishing and giving me something new to share with my son.
